The MS in Education program for Classroom Teachers, Teaching Students with Disabilities, All Grades, combines virtual and online courses over 4 semesters of full-time study; or students may choose to study part-time. The program focuses on the requirements for licensed classroom teachers to teach Pre-K-12 students with diverse learning needs.

The program consists of six core courses (18 credits); four general education courses in math, science, language, and literacy specific to teaching students with diverse learning needs (14 credits); a capstone research seminar (3 credits), and required workshops (see below). Following is the suggested path for full-time study.
